

Prodigal Summer weaves together three stories of human love within a larger tapestry of lives in southern Appalachia. At the heart of these intertwined narratives is a den of coyotes that have recently migrated into the region. Deanna Wolfe, a reclusive wildlife biologist; Eddie Bondo, a young hunter who comes to invade her solitary life; Lusa Landowski, a bookish city girl turned farmer's wife; and a pair of elderly, feuding neighbors find connections to one another, and to the land, and the final, urgent truth that humans are only one piece of life on earth.

MICL BOOK CLUB SELECTION for July 23rd: WEST OF EDEN: AN AMERICAN PLACE by Jean Stein

Stein vividly captures a mythic cast of characters, their ambitions and triumphs as well as their desolation and grief. These stories illuminate the bold aspirations of five larger-than-life individuals and their families. At the center of each family is a dreamer who finds fortune and strife in Southern California: Edward Doheny, the Wisconsin-born oil tycoon; Jack Warner, the son of Polish-Jewish immigrants; Jane Garland, the troubled daughter of an aspiring actress who could never escape her mother's schemes; Jennifer Jones, an actress from Oklahoma who won the Academy Award at twenty-five. Stein chronicles the ascent of her own father, Jules Stein, an eye doctor born in Indiana who transformed Hollywood. The author paints a portrait of an outsider who pins his or her hopes on the nascent power and promise of Los Angeles.

ZOOM Etiquette

Isn't technology amazing? Using ZOOM video conferencing has made it possible to attend a class from the comfort of our own homes. Many of us have become friends over the years so we have missed seeing each other face-to-face.

Thing is, you're on camera now. You may not be aware of what other participants see or hear on their end. We are still learning how to use this tool and communicate with consideration for others. Many members use a computer and laptop monitor in gallery view and see everything in everyone's rooms...simultaneously.

With that in mind, here are some tips and tricks that can help all of us be savvy ZOOM users:

- Learn how to use the chat feature. This is where you can type a comment, ask a question to the moderator, or raise your hand to be in line to speak. If you think you may forget what you want to say, keep a pad and pencil handy to jot it down until the moderator calls on you. This is just like passing around the microphone in the classroom. Patience and courtesy please.
- If you join the call late, no need to explain or apologize; you're forgiven. Again just like in the class-room, it is not necessary to interrupt who is speaking. Make sure your mute feature is on; we will see you joined us.
- Continuously check that your mic is on "mute." When even one person's background noise is audible, to the rest of us, it can sound like a jaunt to the barnyard and louder than you think. Some of us have to have our volume up so we can hear better.
- Keep your camera at eye level no matter the device you are using. If you sit about 4 feet from the lens we will see your face, if you raise your hand, etc. When your camera is too low, we see body parts that you probably wouldn't want to expose or angles most us would not consider flattering. We now understand what it's like to be celebrities!
- If you can, have a light source on your face. A lamp works well if not too close or just sitting near a window where light is cast on your face. We want to see what you look like!
- While you are on camera, be aware we see everything. Personal grooming is a no-no. Drinking a beverage is OK; making food or eating a meal is discouraged. Touching the face frequently is too much motion for those seeing you and very distracting.
- Speaking of moving your device or being in motion while conferencing that's really hard on the eyes. It can be very dizzying on a monitor so close your view to others if you want to move around. And remember if your camera is on, you may have just positioned it somewhere you will regret.
- * The conference host would like to think the session is interesting and you are engaged as a participant. If you did not get enough sleep the night before or need to take a break, it is okay to leave the conference. If we can see your eyes are closed too long, someone may panic and call 911!

These reminders should take you back to the social manners we grew up with as children attending school. It is all about remembering we can be SEEN AND HEARD so let's be the best we can for each other! ZOOM may be the only way we can conduct classes this year.

The year got off to a great start. Our permanent classes remained the same, and all did well. Travels Around the World only got to three continents this year and New Zealand. Both my iPad and desktop insist that New Zealand, along with Australia and Papua New Guinea, are in a part of the ocean called Oceania. In North America, we shared in hiking across America, the Noah's Ark Encounter in Kentucky, and tide pools in California. We visited Nebraska, and Phoenix, plus we saw photos from recent MICL trips.

Leaving our own country, we went north to visit Quebec City, Canada, and south to visit the Lake Chapala area of Mexico. In Europe, we visited Iceland, cruised the Baltic and North Seas, and made two visits to Ireland. We visited nine countries to learn the germ theory of disease. We cruised again, this time going to England on The Queen Mary 2. And one family shared their travels to Scotland, France, and Venice. Asia took us to S.E. Asia twice. One visit was to Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia, and Thailand. The other went to seven countries in that part of the world. We visited Dubai, China, and The Philippines. We visited Japan twice, once on a Shinto Buddhist Pilgrimage, and then to visit some of Japan's cultural treasures.

As always, the Curriculum Committee brought us outstanding five-week classes. In the arts, we had classes on Music Appreciation, Favorite Museums, Comedy of the fifties, and Leonardo da Vinci. In history, we learned about the Aztec Empire, Mysteries of Human Evolution, the Islamic Golden Age, MICL—Meet your Past, Explorers, and had a Presidential Lecture Series.


